Bob Stekl honored with OHA's 2021 Mary Cutter Bickford Award

At their May 27 meeting, the Oswegoland Heritage Association Board of Directors honored Bob Stekl with the association's highest honor, the Mary Cutter Bickford Award for Excellence in Local History.

Stekl retired from the OHA Board in 2019 after more than 18 years' service, and as a museum volunteer in 2020 after 20 years' service.

The award, named for lifelong Oswego resident and local historian, the late Mary Cutter Bickford, recognizes outstanding efforts to preserve Oswego area history. Mary Bickford's collection of hundreds of photographs, documents, and books and ledgers formed the basis for the Little White School Museum's archival collection that currently stands at nearly 32,000 items.

Stekl is the eighth winner of the heritage association's most prestigious award. Previous winners were John Hafenrichter, Ted Clauser, Helen Zamata, Stephanie "Stevie" Todd, Glenn Young, and Cathi Mundsinger.

Even before joining the board, Stekl worked as a volunteer, helping catalog the museum's collections, entering his first item in the museum's database in September 2000.

He was elected to the OHA Board of Directors in May 2001, and served until he declined to seek reelection in 2019. He was appointed assistant museum director shortly after he began volunteering, a position he held until 2020. In addition, he served as heritage association treasurer from 2015 to 2019.

As one of the museum's key volunteers, Stekl was responsible for cataloging 56 percent of its collection, which currently stands at 31,877 artifacts, archival items, and photographs.

During his 18 years on the board, Stekl was responsible for obtaining two state grants that

provided funds to safely store the museum's huge textile collection. Stekl not only applied for and was responsible for obtaining the grant funds, but he also coordinated the purchase of the textile shelving, disassembled the old shelving, erected the new shelving and moved the collection to its new home.

Stekl was also responsible for initiating and gradually expanding the museum's annual "Remembering our Veterans" exhibit. The exhibit started as a single day event with Stekl coordinating various reenactment groups who enlivened the exhibit for the first few years. By his last year as exhibit organizer and coordinator, he was spending uncounted hours overseeing staff and volunteers as they assembled the exhibit, organizing special events such as an Oswego Chamber of Commerce coffee to introduce them to the museum and the exhibit, and greeting guests.

He was also responsible for urging area veterans to donate their uniforms, photos, and other military memorabilia to the muse-

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um's collections, leading to what is today arguably the largest such collection at a small museum in Illinois.

When the OHA Board voted to undertake a major renovation and reimaging of the Little White School Museum's exhibit gallery in 2017, Stekl played a major role in helping plan the new exhibit space, and then spent hours helping select and collect artifacts and other materials used to create the exhibit.

"During the past 20 years, Bob's done it all, from leading youth field trips through the museum to curating and

mounting exhibits, to maintaining and maximizing the museum's storage areas," noted Roger Matile, museum director. "Bob's legacy in assuring the preservation of Oswegoland's rich history will be visible to everyone who visits the Little White School Museum for decades to come."

Programming is once again resuming at the museum...

A full slate of programming will resume at the Little White School Museum this autumn as well as continuing the balance of the summer. Summer Storytime at the Museum, Fridays through Aug. 13, at noon: Make it a FriYAY at the Little White School Museum for free Storytime on Friday afternoons this Summer. Kids, Parents, and Caregivers are welcome to bring a blanket, pack a picnic lunch, and sit on the lawn for either an imaginative reading from the As We Grow Preschool staff or a sweet live performance from the Limelight Theatre Company on the grounds of the Little White School Museum. just two blocks from historic downtown Oswego. Pre-registration—not required—is available at www.oswegolandparkdistrict.org or drop in when your schedule allows. Children must be accompanied by an adult. Suitable for all ages.

Oswego History Walk - Business & Industry, Sunday, Aug. 15, 2 p.m. Participants age 16 and over are invited to journey back in time to discover the businesses and industry that once dotted the landscape of the Oswego area. Trace the spaces and places that served the community and learn about the people behind them. Is there a business from yesteryear still thriving today? Participants should be able to comfortably walk for approximately one hour and be prepared to be part of the conversation. Participants should meet at the Little White School Museum, 72 Polk Street, for this outdoor walk. Pre-registration, \$5, is required referencing program #20634, and space is limited. Cosponsored by the OHA and the OPD.

PrairieFest Quilt Show, Saturday through Monday, Sept. 4-6: The Quilters Dozen Quilt Group and the OPD will co-host the free PrairieFest Quilt Show at Oswego's historic Little White School Museum during the community PrairieFest event. This year's community celebration will be held over Labor Day Weekend. Contemporary and antique quilts, hand and machine quilted, will be on exhibit throughout the Quilt Show. The Quilters Dozen will be seeking family quilts

or quilts area residents have created that they would like to exhibit during the show. Quilts may be dropped off at the Little White School Museum Thursday Sept. 2 between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m.. For more information on exhibiting your quilt visit prairiefest.com.

Boulder Hill at 65: An Anniversary **Celebration**, Saturday, Sept. 11, 1:30 p.m.: Current and former Boulder Hill residents won't want to miss this exhibit accompanied by a multi-media program, "Boulder Hill's First 36 Years," by museum director Roger Matile. Using maps, photos, and slides taken during Boulder Hill's first 36 years by Bev and Ruth Skaggs, Matile will recount the story of what was one of the largest unincorporated subdivisions in Illinois and by far the largest community in Kendall County for its first 40 years of existence. Admission is \$5 for this program aimed at guests age 16 and older. Pre-registration is suggested by referencing program # 20880, but walk-ins are welcome the day of the program on a space-available basis at the Little White School Museum, 72 Polk Street, Oswego.

Oswego History Walk - Downtown Barns, Sunday, Sept. 19 and Oct. 3, 2 **p.m.:** Ever notice the barns in and around Oswego's downtown? Curious about them? Did you think barns could only be found on the area's farms? These answers and the history surrounding them will be covered during this unique walking tour of some of Oswego's urban barns still standing today. Pre-registration, \$5 per person, is required by referencing program #21083 and space is limited for this walk co-hosted by the OHA and the OPD. The walk will be held outdoors starting at the Little White School Museum, 72 Polk Street, and participants should be able to comfortably walk for approximately one hour. The walk will be repeated on Sunday, Oct. 3, at

the same time and place. Reference program #21084 to pre-register.

Classic Stories and Crafts, Saturdays, 10 a.m. Sept. 28, Oct. 16, Dec. 18: Start a new Saturday morning tradition for kids 5-8 accompanied by an adult. Oswego Cemetery Walk, Thursday, Oct. 7, 5-9 p.m.: In partnership with the OHA, the OPD invites you to experience community history through the stories of those who have called our area home during the 20th Oswego Cemetery Walk. Participants will be guided through the cemetery to visit with the ghosts of early Oswego residents and pioneers. Pre-registration required. Remembering Our Veterans, Nov. 10-28, during regular museum hours: Discover the history of Oswego's fighting men and women through an extensive display of rarely seen military artifacts selected from the museum's permanent collection, including photos, uniforms, war souvenirs, and equipment dating from the Civil War, World Wars I and II, the Korean Conflict, the Vietnam War, Iraq, and Afghanistan. Featured will be the Wall of Honor honoring local service members and an exhibit honoring those Oswegoans killed in action. Admission is free.
